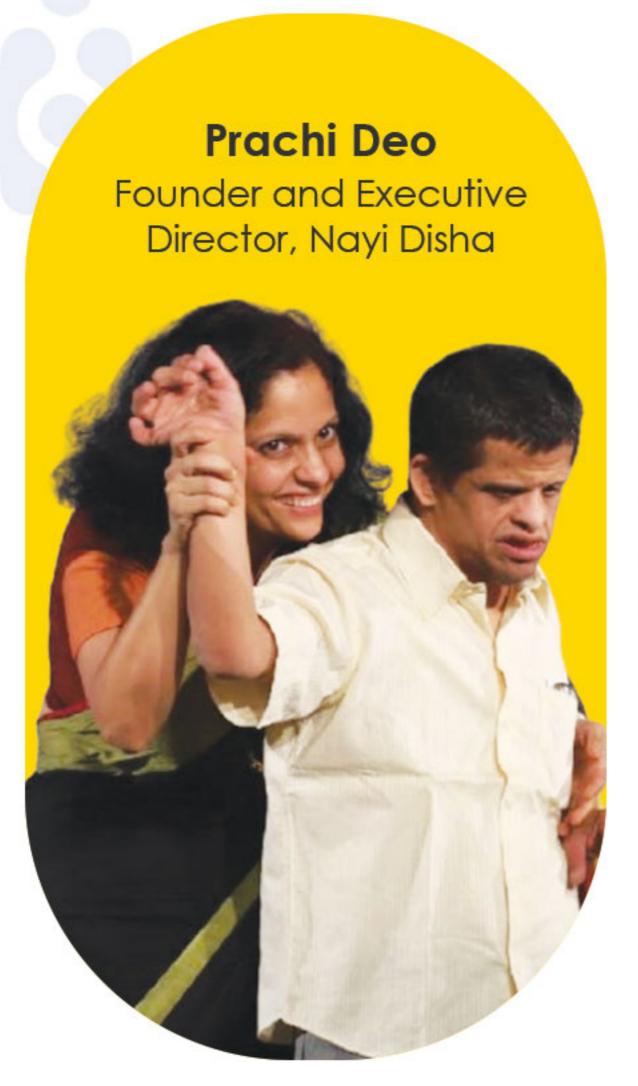




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MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I often reflect on how caregiving profoundly shapes who we become. For me, without my brother, Pranjal, a 52-year-old with Down Syndrome, Nayi Disha simply wouldn't exist. Growing up, I witnessed only unwavering love and determination of my parents to support my brother in every possible way, along with the

struggles they went through due to lack of information, guidance and support for families like ours. My personal journey and of those around me revealed a core truth that families are the real change agents. Yet the system rarely acknowledges or supports them. This conviction became my core belief and Pranjal, the inspiration behind founding Nayi Disha.

Ten years ago, Sudarshana, our co-founder and a very supportive board, we started with a simple yet so powerful belief that every family impacted by Autism, Down Syndrome, and other developmental disabilities deserves access to the right information, support, and dignity. What began as conversations with worried parents has evolved into a nationwide community where no family walks alone.

Over the years, we have witnessed caregivers transform from seekers of support to drivers of change. They've become leaders, building peer communities, advocating for rights, and even joining Nayi Disha to carry the vision forward. Watching this transformation has been my greatest inspiration and reward.

None of this would have been possible without our funders, grant makers, allies who believed that empowering caregivers is not charity, but the pathway to systemic change. We are deeply grateful for their support. We have always been inspired by our incredible partner organisations with their years of work and learnt from their journeys.

At Nayi Disha, we are committed to building a strong, collaborative network that accelerates impact nationwide. It has been especially heartening to work closely with public systems to co-create caregiver support structures that truly reach the last mile. These partnerships ensure that families in every community, rural or urban, have access to the care, knowledge, and dignity they deserve.

As we celebrate 10 years, we stand at an inflection point ready to scale our programmes, strengthen caregiver and community led models and embed our work within existing health and social welfare frameworks to ensure the last mile reach. We are collaborating with like-minded organisations to bring diverse perspectives, amplify voices and drive collective advocacy to scale and create systemic impact.

The report is dedicated to all caregivers and their loved ones, to every parent who refused to give up, every sibling who advocated, every small breakthrough they made at home, and every barrier they have lifted as changemakers. For caregivers are the changemakers and future of support. Here's to the next decade of hope, dignity, and empowered families!



Nayi Disha was born with a sister's experience of seeing the challenges her family faced with raising a child with developmental disabilities. That families need more than just medical diagnoses and professional help, they need a lifelong partner to walk alongside them. Nayi Disha was established in 2015 with a simple yet powerful belief that every family raising a child with intellectual and developmental disabilities deserves access to reliable information, compassionate support, and a community that understands their journey.

What started as a simple online initiative in Hyderabad to share reliable information has, over the past decade, grown into a thriving ecosystem of care, connecting families, experts, and organisations across India. Today, Nayi Disha stands not just as a digital resource hub, but a holistic circle of care and support reaching over nine lakh individuals, offering free multilingual support and nurturing peer support communities across India.

This report chronicles a decade of learning, growing, and reimagining what's possible when families are empowered with knowledge and connected through community. It echoes a few caregivers' journeys, their triumphs, unspoken fear and enduring hope. Their voices thread through this report, reminding us, again and again, why our work matters. It celebrates the resilience of thousands of parents, the dedication of our team and volunteers, and the partnerships that have made our work possible.

But numbers tell only part of the story. The real story of Nayi Disha is found in the thousands of moments of connection. A mother finding clarity through a phone call, a father discovering solidarity with other parents and realising that he is not alone in his fears, a young sibling feeling understood for the first time. It is in these everyday moments that real change quietly begins when information becomes confidence and community becomes strength.

A MOTHER'S JOURNEY THROUGH HOPE AND COURAGE

At the heart of our work lies a belief that has constantly guided each step of our journey that is 'No family should be left behind'. It's the philosophical foundation upon which Nayi Disha has been built and continues to grow. This belief has shaped our innovations, programs, partnerships, and our ethos. Keeping the needs of the families at the centre and creating solutions that reflect lived realities, this lens has allowed us to build a community that is proactive.

For M. Vidyasree (Hyderabad, Telangana), their family's life turned upside down when her son Krishna was diagnosed with autism at the age of nineteen months. "Him being unable to speak and avoiding gazes left me reeling. Initially, I clung to the thought that therapy could fix things within three years. Lacking knowledge alongside assurance, I stumbled through those first times feeling utterly isolated."



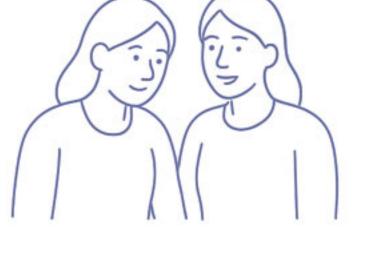
Back in 2016, life shifted when Vidya attended one of the workshops by Nayi Disha at Rainbow Hospital on Cognitive Behaviour Therapy. Hearing the consulting psychologist and doctors talk while surrounded by fellow parents, for the first time it occurred to her that this community understood what she was going through.



"For the first time I felt that I am not alone and there is someone to reach out and care about your pain which was much better support than what my family offered at that time. I started understanding autism differently, thanks to Nayi Disha's support groups alongside one-on-one chats with other parents, that it is not a problem that needs to be solved. It's more about consistent help over time. Experienced mothers and fathers showed me the ropes. It helped in being more patient with my child and improved my connection with our son. We reset our priorities and now focus more on creating a stable foundation and support system so that our son can flourish. Today, he's doing wonderfully studying in sixth grade."



She adds, "Our journey has just begun and I also want to share my learnings with other parents. And Nayi Disha parent community is just the place to do so. It means being empowered, it means being a part of a big family, a Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, to look after each other."



Vidya continues to be an active member of the Nayi Disha community, lending her expertise to help us reach more Telugu-speaking caregivers translating valuable informational and knowledge based content that supports them in their caregiving journey.



Through years of close and systemic interactions with families, we found that most caregivers view peer-led support, streamlined communication on rights and policies, and more accessible, practical resources and training as critical to improving their caregiving experience and outcomes.

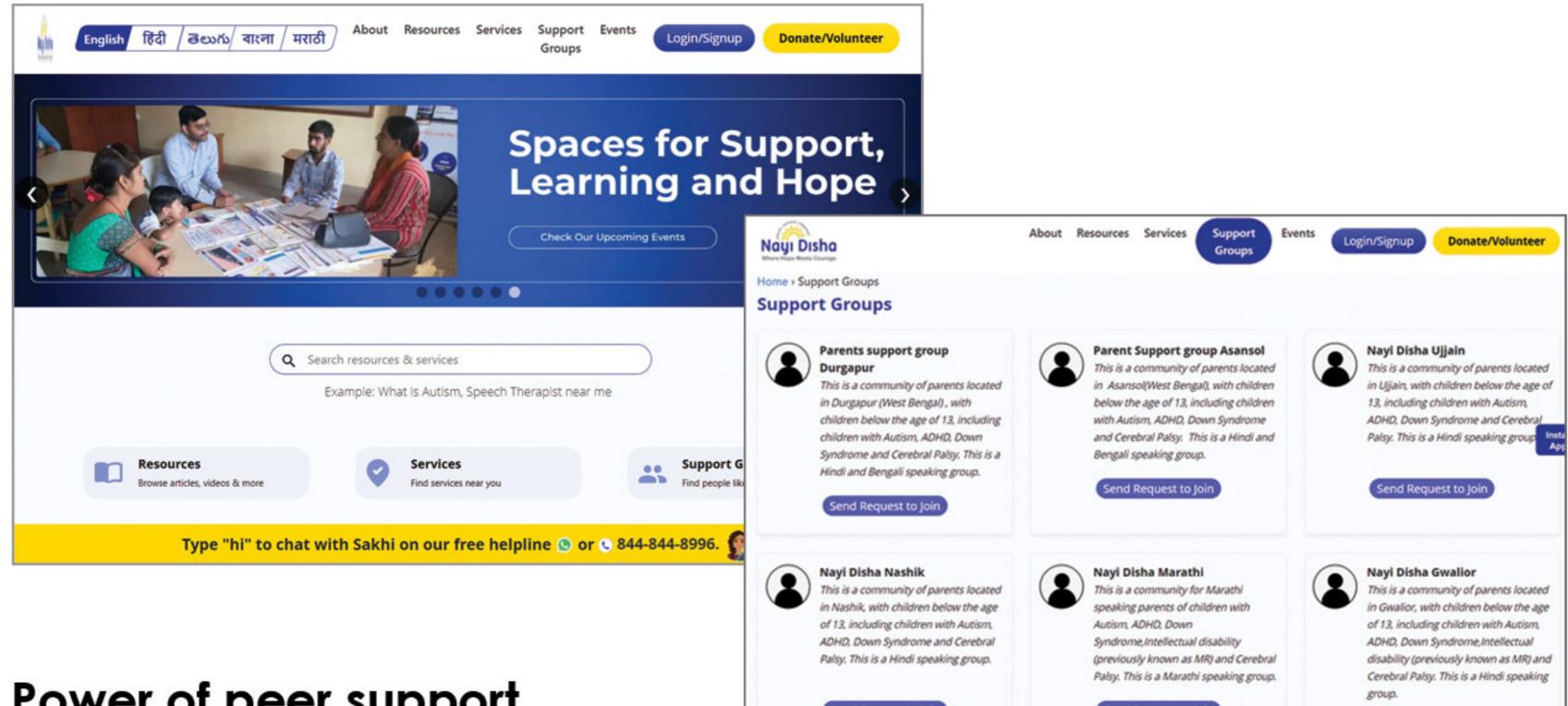


Inclusion by design

Our promise of working with families begins with a core belief that every family, regardless of their geography, socio-economic status, language, or their child's disability, deserves access to reliable information and empathetic support. Our solutions and services are designed to reach families wherever they are. Be it a metropolitan like Hyderabad and Delhi or remote villages in Telangana and Jharkhand, from Hindi-speaking communities in North India to Marathi-speaking families in the West.

Our digital platform ensures easy and large scale accessibility for those with internet access and offline community building initiatives and support networks for those without. Our free helpline support bridges the digital divide, ensuring that a family without a smartphone can still receive the expert guidance they need. We've designed our platforms for varying levels of digital literacy. Our website navigation is intuitive, content is mobile-optimised (because many families primarily use smartphones), and our service directory includes multiple search options to accommodate different ways people look for help.

This multi-dimensional accessibility ensures that when we say "leaving no family behind," we mean it across every dimension of access.



Power of peer support

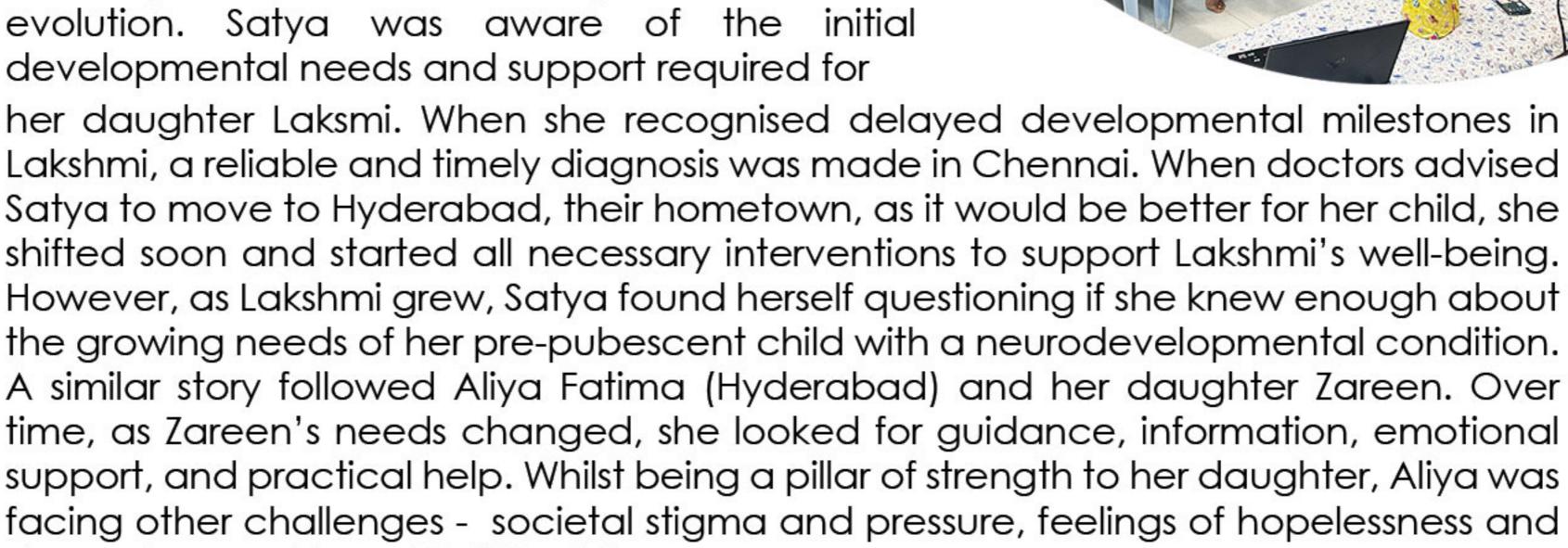
There is something irreplaceable about connecting with someone who truly understands your experience because they have lived it. When a mother shares how she managed her child's first day at father school, when describes navigating the disability certification process, or when an experienced parent reassures a newly diagnosed family that life will find its rhythm, it is in these moments that families feel seen and find validation in ways that no guidebook or professional opinion can. Peer support holds the power to transform families who once sought help to become the guides for others following behind them.

For the past ten years, Satya Kishori Thatavarthy (Hyderabad, Telangana) has been a part of the Nayi Disha community, one of many parents whose journey mirrors the organisation's own evolution. Satya was aware of the initial



This is when the holistic support offered by Nayi Disha, based in workshops, informational resources, and parent community, became their companion. For both Satya and Aliya, stepping into Nayi Disha's support system was like stepping into light after years of fumbling in the dark. They attended several workshops and events like Dirty feet, Aao Khelein, Abhivyakti that empowered them with community and knowledge. For Satya, after joining Nayi Disha she felt more comfortable and confident as she could share her thoughts with and continuously learn from more experienced parents. She says:

"The knowledge I gained helped me to support and continue my journey. I got a lot of information regarding doctors, therapy centres, etc. I became more confident in handling my child when she is showing tantrums in public spaces like airports, malls, railway stations, etc."

For Aliya, Nayi Disha was a source of information and access to a support system that lifted her up at a time when it seemed impossible. The workshops helped her understand Zareen. Campaigns for Open Door Policy helped shape her perspective of doctors and guided her in identifying the right therapists for her daughter. Nayi Disha's helpline counsellors taught her to focus on her child and make decisions that affect her, rather than the society. Surely, easier said than done, but it was made possible, as she says in her words because:

"Nayi Disha team reminded me that the decisions I was taking for Zareen were the best for her, and most importantly they made me feel that I am not alone. I still call the helpline whenever I need reliable information on government schemes and disability certifications. Connecting with Nayi Disha will help you find guidance, emotional strength, and the right direction for your child. It's a place to learn and unlearn, to recognise that my child has her own strengths and rhythm, and things will fall into place when the time is right."

For families raising children with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs), the first step towards empowerment often begins with access to trusted and timely information and guidance. Parents like Satya and Aliya are not just caregivers, they are navigators of a complex system that offers few maps. Reliable knowledge helps them make informed decisions about therapies, education, and daily living and, most importantly, replaces fear with understanding.

What's remarkable about Nayi Disha's model is how knowledge, skills and community support transforms them into change agents. Once parents begin to understand, they start to connect and that connection creates change beyond individual families.

Across three years of surveys, Nayi Disha Support Groups have shown a consistent and powerful role in providing emotional support connection to parents children with disabilities. The majority of parents shared that being part of the group made them feel less alone in their parenting journey.

Over 80–90% state that reading others' experiences engaging in conversations helped them realise they are not alone. Around **75–80%** of caregivers say the groups allowed them to share their own emotions and challenges with others on a similar path, creating a safe space for empathy and mutual understanding.

Beyond emotional relief, more than 40–50% of parents reported developing a sense of belonging within the Nayi Disha community and a greater acceptance of their child for who they are. The groups also facilitated new friendships and connections, peer strengthening the community's social fabric.



Our work is built around providing holistic care and support for caregivers where they can receive support which emotional, informational, educational and communal. Through our helpline, support groups, expert workshops and webinars, parent training programs and an extensive digital resource centre, we ensure that every caregiver has access to knowledge, empathy and guidance required to nurture their child's future.



A Digital Word of Mouth & a Life Impacted

Radha Kartik, hailing from a small village Pagalahalli in Dharmapuri district of Tamil **Nadu**, and her son Vivan found themselves alone and unaware of how to navigate Autism. Her husband had left her as he was in denial about Vivan's different neurodevelopmental needs and withdrew emotionally and financially. Radha had only her mother, a daily wage labourer, to fall back on for support. On a good day, it was only about making ends meet and having food on the table.

In 2022, Radha's quest for information led her to watching YouTube channels of other mothers who have navigated autism and might help her journey. In the process of learning more, she got to know about Nayi Disha from a Tamil content creator who was a caregiver. Though this was a one-way communication, Radha found a way forward. She googled Nayi Disha and called our helpline number. The team understood her problems, and supported her. However, they recognised that she only spoke in Tamil and financial constraints were a major challenge in navigating services.

At the time, during the Covid-19 era, Radha was attending online classes for therapy. However, the therapy centre stopped providing services to her, citing poor connectivity and missed classes as an issue. Rains in the village further weakened the little connection Radha could find at these places.

Our helpline team had connected her to one of the Parent Champions (PC) from Hyderabad, who has chosen to remain anonymous but is the pillar of support, who assisted Radha in navigating the right services and advocating for her needs. She called up the centre advocating for Radha, explaining all the hardship she had been facing and how she needed the access to services. Eventually she resumed therapy. However, Radha quickly realised that her child needed occupational therapy support, and switched from online classes to finding offline centres close to her village. Yet again, accessibility to resources combined with Vivan's unmet support needs made it difficult for her to travel.

Our PC's out of the box thinking came through for Radha again. She contacted another parent advocate who runs a Trust which offers different therapies online. What supported the family here was discussions in their local language and ease of conversation. Things went on for a few months but challenges continued for Radha.

Recently, her mother has fallen sick and therapy has fallen off track. Currently, she continues to receive support from the PC and they are currently aiming to find an occupational therapist subsidised fee to re-establish support.

Yes. Radha's challenges seem unending. This is because of systems that often forget those at the margins; those with little to no financial support, and those who never see the sight of resources promised to trickle down to villages. As an organisation based in community-building, offer we resources, guidance, and heartfelt support. However, for change to be effective, we need on-ground services and professionals that reach to the remotest part of the country.



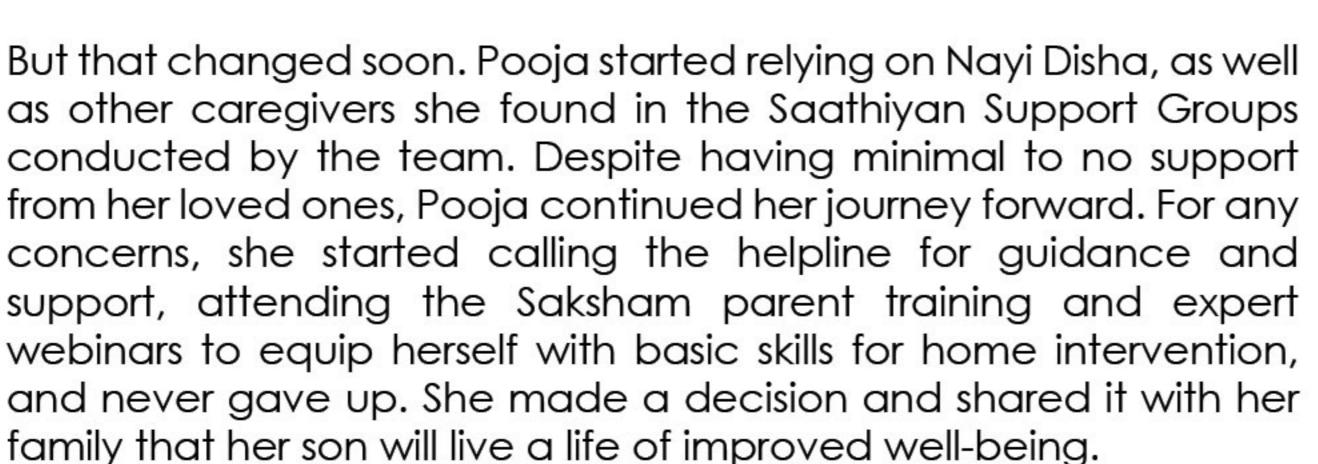


A LIFELINE OF GUIDANCE: SUPPORTING FAMILIES **EVERY STEP OF THE WAY**

Pooja's story (Raipur, Chhattisgarh) is one that beautifully reflects how consistent and expert support can transform a family's journey. Sometimes we have the right knowledge, but no space to share how this knowledge shapes our inner world. These words echo the truth of mothers who learn to understand the neurodevelopmental differences of their children, but seldom receive socio-emotional support. For Pooja and her son a similar story followed before she connected with Nayi Disha.

Four years ago, at a Nayi Disha Helpdesk event hosted in collaboration with the District Early Intervention Centre in India (DEIC) in Rajnandgoan, Chattisgarh we met Pooja. She was filled with anxiety and no social or emotional support. Being from a science background, she recognised her son's autism diagnosis, and the difficulties he had to face owing to misunderstandings of his sensory needs. However, in her pursuit of supporting her child, she found that the generation gap in her family meant her in-laws could not understand either her or her child. Social dynamics of being part of the family system further complicated things and it seemed like even though they were living together, she could only rely on herself to support.



Initially, her support inquiries were largely rooted in fear like she and her son rarely stepped outside home except for occasional functions. But as time passed, fear gave way to clarity. Guided by the helpline counsellors and fueled by her own determination, Pooja began taking charge of her path exploring government schemes, identifying schooling options, and planning for her son's future. With her persistent efforts, her son is currently enrolled in an inclusive Kendriya Vidyalaya School. Pooja recalls how much Nayi Disha's helpline provided the support she needed at the most crucial times: "When I had no one, and no support, that is when Nayi Disha stood by me. Their Counsellors, their words, their sessions – it all gave me strength."







True to her words to her family, today, her son is leading a life full of curiosity and learning. With her patience and acceptance of her son's concerns, she is able to support him through his sensory differences. Today, everyone in her family admires her and her son for their growth.

For Pooja, meeting Nayi Disha, was the start of a Nayi Disha (new direction). She says she still goes through periods of time when she is upset and unnerved, but she has now imbibed her learnings from the counselling support and is able to do those things herself. In this manner, a bond based on trust and support has made Pooja self-reliant and independent. "It comes to me automatically – the thought that was shared with me earlier – if not today, then tomorrow," she says.

So, with this has Pooja stopped being a part of Nayi Disha? Quite the opposite, she still calls us. Sometimes every fortnight, because the bond that she shares with us is of trust and belonging. A safe space where she can walk-in anytime. After being connected to us for 4 years, she says that her confidence has developed to a point where she is able to help others in a similar boat. Her efforts have truly shone through with other Nayi Disha parents and is now one of our Parent Champions who facilitates change for others around her.

She adds that wherever she gets a chance, she makes parents aware to join Nayi Disha, the support groups, the helpline, or in whatever way they can connect to the team.

"You feel a sense of belonging, a love, a connection. If you get stuck, they (Nayi Disha Team) are always there." Indeed, for our caregivers, we always are there where they need us.



- 25% of caregivers received guidance to successfully apply for government schemes and documentation like the UDID card, Niramaya health insurance, and disability certificates, reducing financial and procedural barriers.
- About **22% of parents** shared that they now have a better understanding of their child's condition.
- 15% of parents are able to apply practical parenting strategies at home from behaviour management to language and daily living skill development.
- 15% of these (4,979) were repeat interactions, reflecting the continued trust and reliance families place on our support.
- 118 parents reached out more than 10 times, the highest being 147 and 76 calls overtime, showing deep engagement and an ongoing relationship with our team.

These patterns indicate that Nayi Disha is not just an information source but a sustained support system, accompanying families through different stages of their child's developmental and inclusion journey.





A Nayi Disha mother who is now guiding thousands of others



A journey started when Kedar was 4 years old, and Lavanya Sriram (Hyderabad) mastered knowledge required to support her child in his journey of living with a neurodevelopmental condition. The journey, like any other, had its ups and downs that left their family with a lot to deal with. Navigating systems that cater to symptoms rather than the person meant lapses in clinical and schooling. However, care undefeated, Lavanya knew there is more to the story of her son than what people think. Around that age, she recognized Kedar communicated using pictures and drawings. Over time, Lavanya cemented it all in the power of love, care and affection, and also went on to pursue special education to help her child and like him. Today, their others perseverance together tells us a story of an artist revered by everyone around them.

So, if all were taken care of, why and how did Lavanya join Nayi Disha, became a Parent Champion, and subsequently now is a core leadership member leading the helpline?

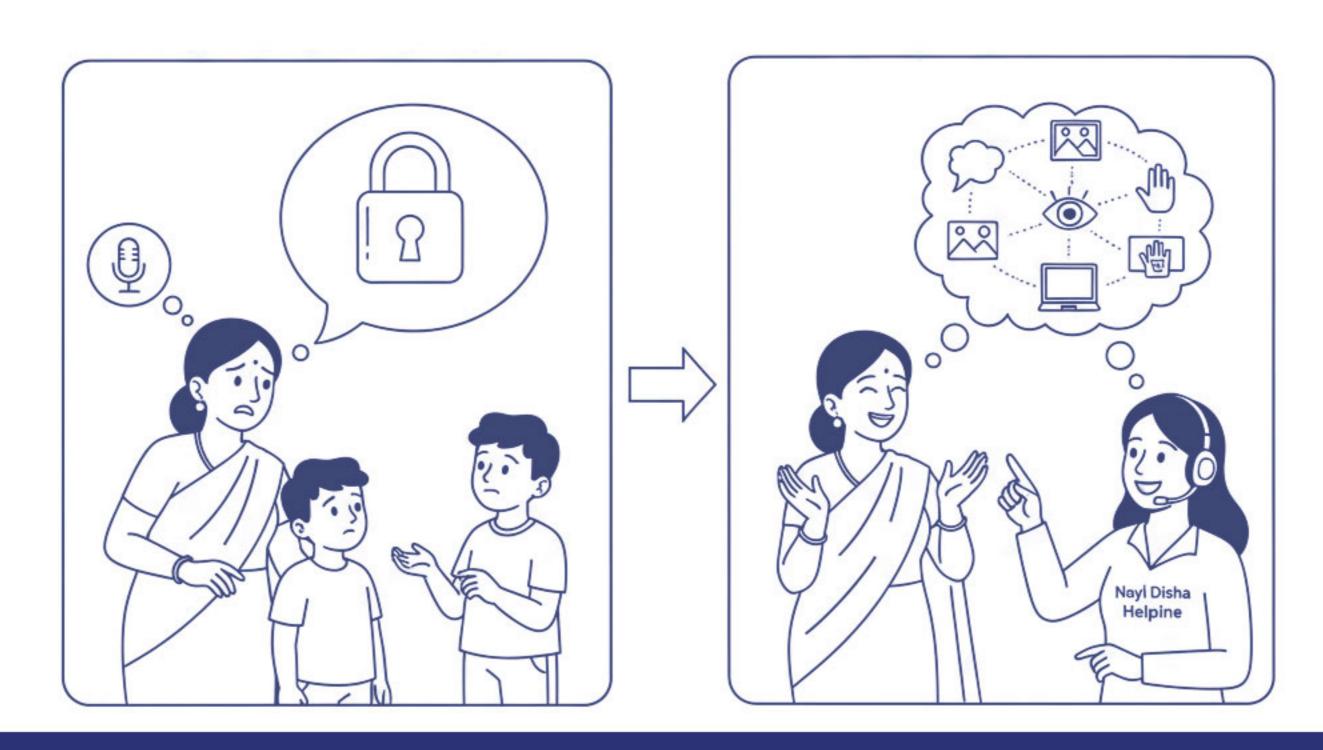
Well, Kedar's emotion-filled art was often the subject of Lavanya's Instagram and Facebook posts. Little did she know that a bigger platform awaited them. In 2017, Lavanya was introduced to Nayi Disha's flagship annual event called Abhivyakti, a space to showcase the talent of children with intellectual and developmental disabilities, be it in dance, music, baking, art and crafts, or any other field. Abhivyakti was a platform that left Lavanya surprised by Kedar's marketing skills. For the first time, she also found herself connected to caregivers in a network where there was more than just knowledge exchange; she felt more like a caregiver than just a professional in the field.

After the event, she became part of Nayi Disha's support group. "We had an opportunity to travel and exhibit in Delhi," she tells us as she received information regarding more such exhibitions, platforms and opportunities that she did know of before joining our caregiver network. Through the group she was also able to ask for more information regarding therapies out of her domain, including Psychological therapies such as Emotion Focused Therapy.



From the receiving end, Lavanya joined the giving end as well, and today, Lavanya inspires other parents like hers through Nayi Disha helpline. She recalls a story when she supported a parent in understanding the difference between speech and communication, and during an offline support group, that parent met her, overjoyed, and told her they were working relentlessly on "communication" rather than forcing the norm of speech as the only mode of communication on their child. From a mother, special educator to now leading Nayi Disha helpline, her journey is testament for how lived experiences of a caregiver are the true source of evolving into change agents in society for others.

For her, "Giving is a lot more pleasurable than taking" and Nayi Disha allows for both to happen for her as a professional and a caregiver. Nayi Disha, for Lavanya, represents, "connection, the networking and the feeling of community, that we are part of, that we are not alone. That tends to happen when you join Nayi Disha."



Strengthening care and caregiving

Caregiving is sustainable only when it is shared. Like age-old wisdom, learning and experiences have to be passed on, experiences have to be shared and solidarity has to be found in knowing that there is a walked down path to navigate all this. Our support groups and parent networks have become spaces of emotional strength and collective advocacy.

As our model has evolved, we have seen its ripple effect extend far beyond individual families. Over time, our community building initiative transforming into community engagement where many parents have evolved into active participants as Parent Champions, turning their personal experiences into creating a stronger and more inclusive ecosystem.

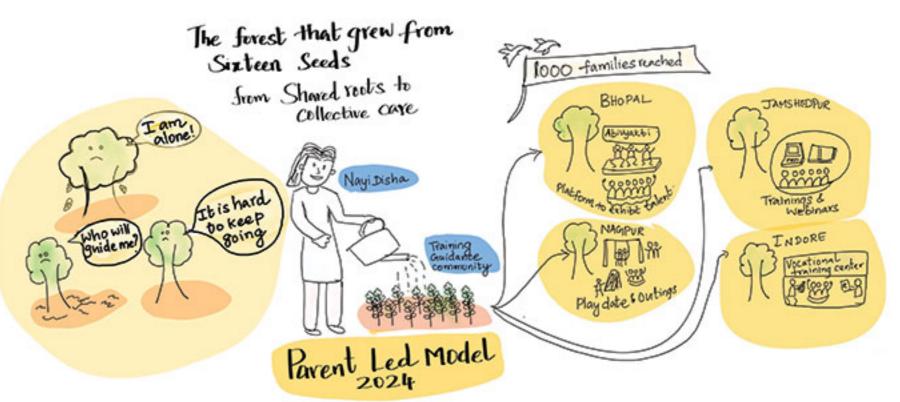


Empowering parents to lead local communities

Recognising that sustainable change comes from within communities, Nayi Disha launched a parent-led model in 2024 to further strengthen our community-led model. This project aimed at creating a semi-formal structure for peer-led support ensuring that caregiving groups, communities could sustain themselves through local leadership and shared experience.

We identified and trained 16 Parent Champions who had shown some initiative and active engagement to lead support groups. Through a series of online and in-person training sessions, Nayi equipped them with leadership skills, facilitation techniques, and knowledge to organise local activities and support group meetings. These Parent Champions became the catalyst for their respective city-based communities. They conducted AA-style support group meetings, organised community events and connected newly diagnosed families to verified information and trusted professionals.

To foster continuous motivation and connection, Nayi Disha team hosted regular online PC meetings, distributed kits, and guided Parent welcome Champions in setting city-specific goals. Within a year, each location developed its own rhythm and the results reflected the power of community-led initiatives. Around 1,000 parents participated in various activities including support group meetings, awareness events and workshops.



In Bhopal, parent champions took charge, organising fortnightly support group meetings, coordinating public events, and finally organising Abhivyakti, Nayi Disha's flagship annual celebration, for the first time outside Hyderabad. In Nagpur, parent champions created lists of inclusive recreational centres and fostered community bonds through social events and Women's Day gatherings. Jamshedpur's champions collaborated with experts to organise training and webinars for the local community. A few Indore parent champions came together to build a vocational centre for children.

Across all cities, WhatsApp support groups transformed from merely being information channels to active peer support networks offering families a safe space for dialogue, emotional support, and knowledge-sharing and transforming mind-sets.

83% of Jharkhand families and 75% of Nagpur families shared that they no longer felt alone in their caregiving journey.

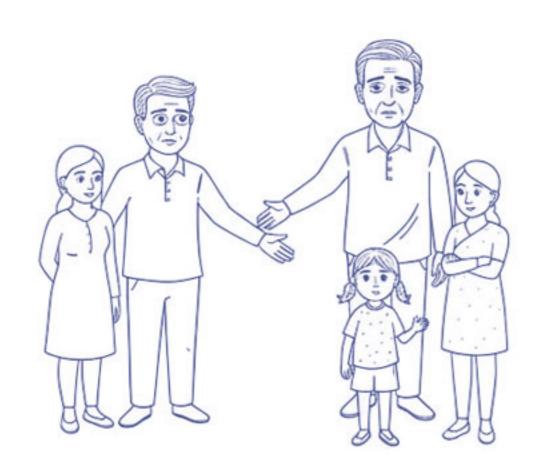


A father's journey from hope to empowerment

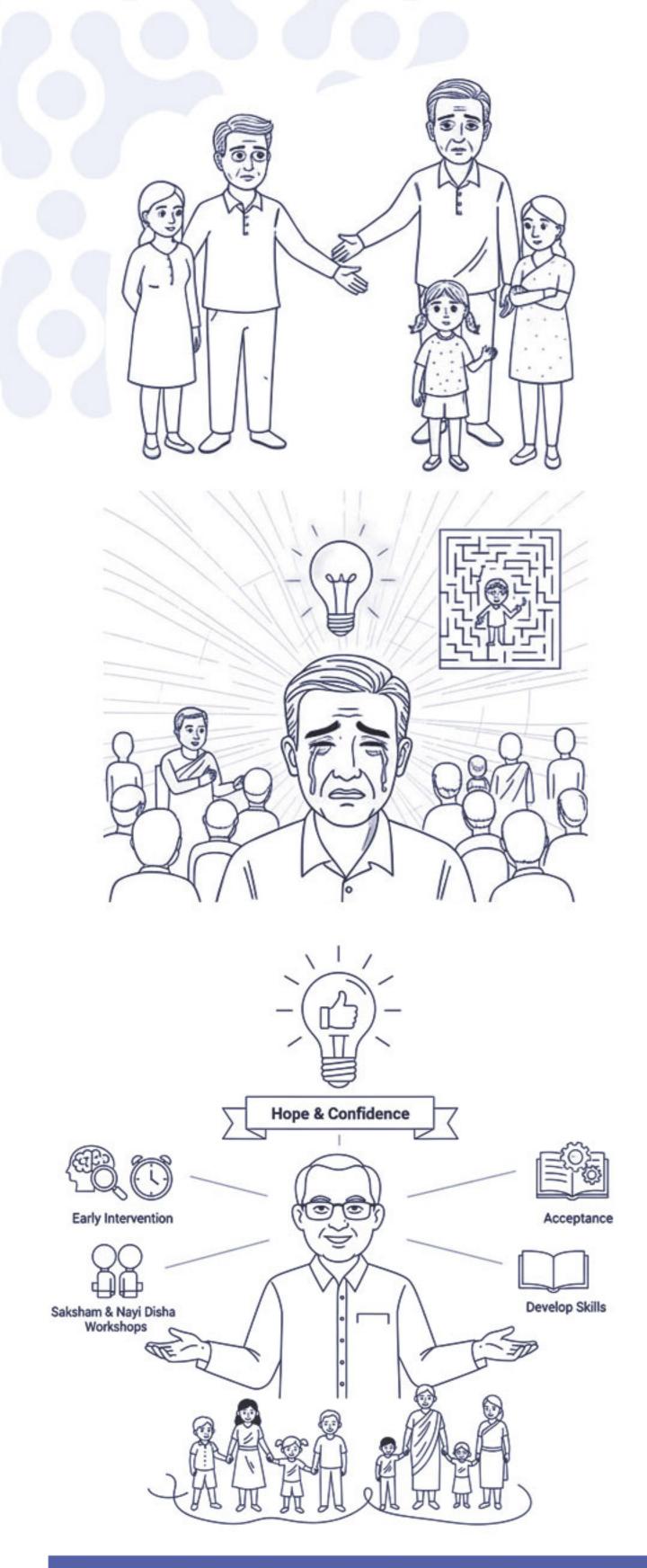
For Mr. J M Gaur, a Parent Champion at Bhopal, the journey has been nothing short of being transcendental. When their elder son was diagnosed with autism at the age of three, the family, living in a small town Ratlam, had no access to proper guidance. As Mr. Gaur recalls, "We didn't even know what autism was. We had no access to the right specialists, awareness and no support network."



The family moved from one city to another, Ratlam, Mathura, Vidisha, Mumbai, Indore, and Bhopal searching for answers. Trying every possibility from homeopathy to spending long hours in clinics. "We were new parents. We were desperate. We thought medicines could fix it". The long, uncertain years of trying every possible treatment left them drained. Being removed from schools, facing discrimination at every step. Years passed, and when their second child was also diagnosed with autism, the family was heartbroken - yet this time, wiser. "By then, we knew there was no cure." Only the right therapy and understanding could help."



Once he tried to help navigate a family with a daughter with autism, offering insights from my own experiences. But they brushed me off asserting my lack of qualification and intrusion. But one year later, they returned, probably more than advice for simply finding someone who understood them.



About **65–70%** of parents reported a major transformation in their own mindset and approach, shifting from frustration or shouting to calm, structured, and compassionate responses after attending Saksham training. Nearly **75%** have become more confident, patient, and are able to understand their children's needs better.

Yet, beneath the surface of these milestones was a father who carried years of guilt for not knowing, not doing enough, not understanding his older son's needs. "If only I had known then what I know now, I wouldn't have been so unfair to him.", he says.

It was in 2022, that Mr. Gaur met the Nayi Disha team at a Helpdesk at CRC Bhopal. That led him to attend the first Saksham training conducted in the city. "The trainer made us experience what our children face. The confusion, not knowing what to do or how to respond, the anxiety. She told us, this is what your child feels every day. That moment changed everything for me. I cried. I realised my son was not disobedient. He was trying to make sense of our world." The session helped him see his son not through the lens of 'fixing' but of understanding."

Through Nayi Disha's parent training and support group network, he found not just guidance but also belonging. "Before this, I felt alone. Society doesn't understand. You get blamed for this being our fault." But within the Nayi Disha community, he found people who listened without judgment. Today, he is a Parent Champion and community advocate guiding other families to access UDID and Niramaya schemes, identify the right schools, find special educators and occupational therapists, and above all, to hold on to hope. "In Ratlam and Ujjain, my child faced deep discrimination. Today, guide parents how to advocate for inclusion and navigate society with strength and dignity. Parents call me when they don't know what to do - about therapy, school, or just to talk. We try to solve their problems together. The other day a mother opened up about her husband's alcohol addiction and lack of family support. Our parent champions group then decided to make this one of our core areas to address collectively."

His message to new parents is one born of lived experience, "Acceptance is the first step in this journey. Early intervention is critical to address your child's needs. Work on developing your own skills. Sakhsam training and Nayi Disha workshops are a good source for that. Maintain hope and confidence. We all are here for you."

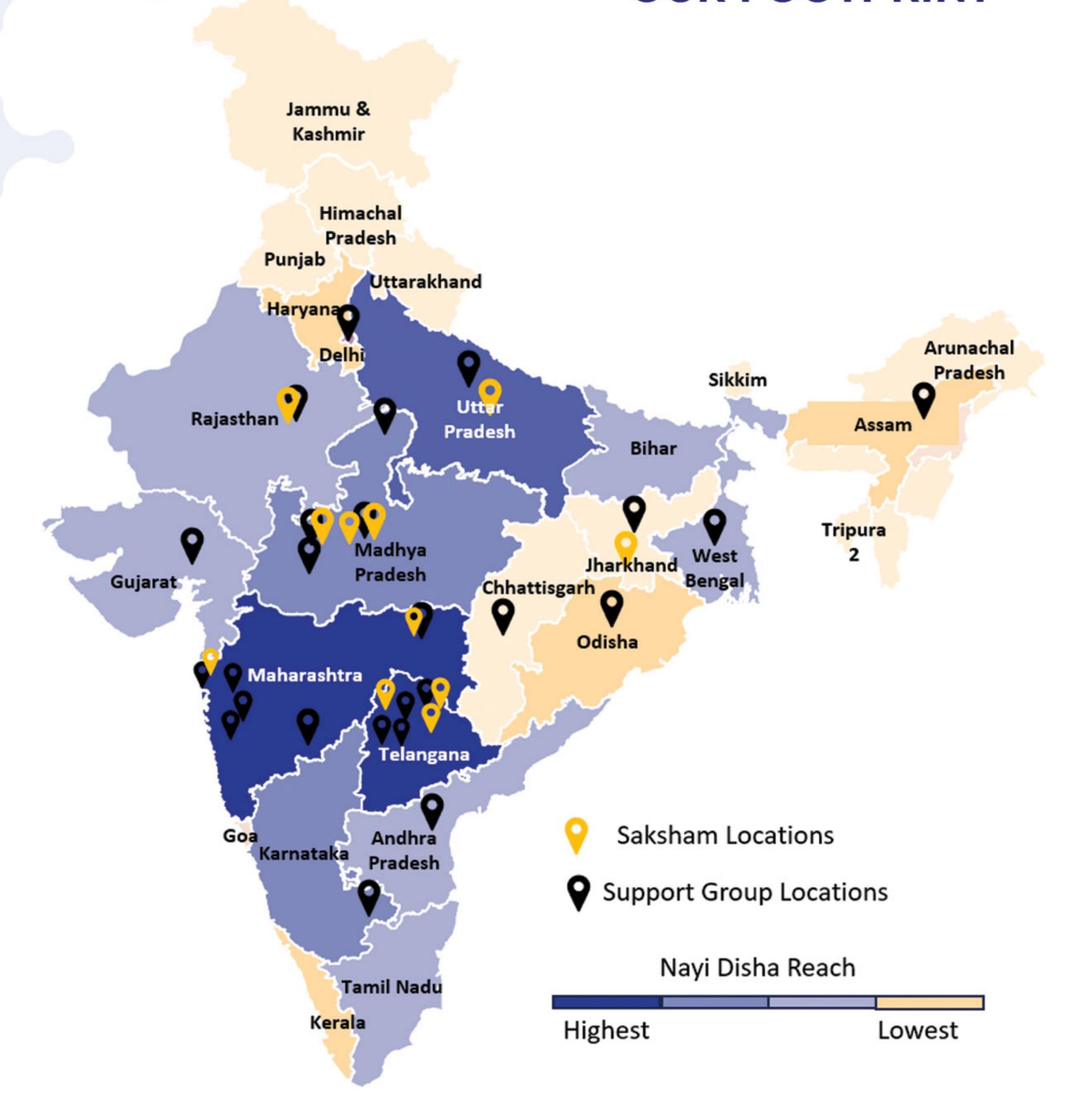

My daughter, Siddhi, is 8 years old and has been diagnosed with ASD and ADHD. She has come a long way in her development especially in her daily living skills, where she now excels.

Before connecting with Nayi Disha, life was very difficult. My child's father didn't understand her condition and left us. I faced severe financial issues and had no social support. My daughter's sensory challenges and meltdowns were often misunderstood by people around us. My biggest struggle was not having a strong support system.

Everything began to change when I connected with the Nayi Disha Helpline to understand my child better. I had so many questions about schooling, communication, and handling her challenges. I now dream of starting a small toy and book library for families, where parents can share and borrow resources, helping one another just as Nayi Disha helped me. To every parent beginning this journey, "never give up".

BUILDING AN INCLUSIVE SUPPORT **ECOSYSTEM FOR FAMILIES. THE WAY** FORWARD.

Caregiving is a lifelong journey that demands resilience, knowledge, and support. By placing family caregivers at the centre of all our interventions over the last decade, we have been focusing on identifying practical, scalable interventions that empower families and improve outcomes for both caregivers and children.

When Nayi Disha began its journey, one question guided our work. How can families of individuals with developmental disabilities find the clarity and confidence they need to support their children? Back then, the challenges were immediate and personal. The families face a constant flux of decisions daily about therapies, education, finances, and future care and often while frequently battling uncertainty, prejudice, and a system that is not designed for them. Reliable information was hard to find, social stigma ran deep, and conversations around developmental disabilities were confined to clinical spaces, if any.

Over the past decade, Nayi Disha has stood alongside these families as a trusted companion, enabling them with knowledge, connections, and strength. Our holistic model of Inform–Connect–Empower is designed to meet caregivers wherever they are in their journey. However, we have also learned that just working with families is not enough. The true empowerment comes with an ecosystem that fosters care and acceptance at every stage. A support system that truly understands lived experiences of those providing care, responds with empathy, and evolves through collaboration.



The challenges families face are multi-faceted that also require solutions which integrate support healthcare, across education, employment, and community resources. When all these diverse factors align, they build an interconnected of web support ecosystems where care is collaborative, expertise is shared and each family feels valued and upheld.

"A child reaches their potential through the strength of many, not the efforts of one."

Our approach has therefore evolved from providing help and support to accessible families through information and knowledge working strategically in enabling an entire ecosystem . One that connects local communities, digital resources, public systems, and caregivers themselves into a shared framework of care.

A phygital future

As we move towards the next decade, our vision is clear to create a responsive and inclusive ecosystem that brings family caregivers, governments, civic agencies, professionals and communities together under one umbrella. Rooted in our human-centric tech interventions, we are expanding our reach to vernacular languages and underserved geographies in Tier 2, 3, and 4. By developing content that is tailored for mobile and low-bandwidth access, the organisation is addressing information inequity. This expansion not only extends the reach of reliable resources but also strengthens early intervention and informed caregiving practices.

Through the next decade, digital inclusivity and literacy is set to become a cornerstone of Nayi Disha's strategy, turning isolated caregivers into informed participants in a nationwide ecosystem of support.

Establish local caregiver collectives as grassroots support networks

Our focus will be on creating self-sustainable, community-driven support structures through transforming individual caregivers into active members of a peer-led network. A critical component of this lies in community building and engagement. Caregivers who once reached out for help should become peer mentors. Through structured skill and leadership development programs, these mentors will take the light forward to transform local support groups into spaces where families share strategies, reliable service recommendations and support each other's advocacy efforts. These communities become the conduits for digital adoption for learning how to use WhatsApp, Chatbots, and online resources in ways that feel intuitive.





to establish sustainable early support systems to empower rural caregivers (Anganwadi workers) of children identified with delays or at risk of delays under the age group of 0-6 years in Sehore district of Madhya Pradesh. This is suitably aligned with the early childhood guidelines stated under Navchetana framework and Divyang protocol.

Over the next five years, we aim to train 350 Anganwadi workers, screen 25,000 children and support 3000 caregivers with home-based interventions across selected blocks. Building on this evidence, Nayi Disha will work with state government partners to scale the model across other districts, embedding it within the public health and early childhood systems to ensure long-term sustainability and impact.



Strengthen cross-sector collaboration

Strategic partnerships and collaborations will be integral to strengthen and scale impact for the caregivers. Achieving this requires a multi-dimensional approach that combines organisational growth, the creation of public goods, replication of proven models, and targeted policy advocacy. We will be partnering with like-minded organisations offering community-based services replicate our model, ensuring the local communities receive services as per their diverse needs and also strengthening grass-root networks. We will scale our efforts to collaborate with local governments, civic agencies and disability departments to make support reach underserved communities at scale. Pilot programs, like project Saarthi, for training primary healthcare workers for digital home-based interventions will be scaled to provide early childhood development intervention in rural and semi-urban areas.

Drive evidence based advocacy

Every call to Nayi Disha's helpline and every interaction within the community generates valuable insights about caregiver needs, systemic gaps, and challenges faced by children with IDDs. The data and evidence from digital platforms and on-ground initiatives will inform awareness generating efforts and help strengthen advocacy for policy change moving the ecosystem from reactive support to proactive inclusion. Nayi Disha will systematically analyse this data to inform advocacy efforts especially focusing on key issues such as child protection, therapy centre regulation, and inclusive schooling, using evidence to highlight pressing issues at the state and national levels. These insights can shape resource mobilisation and allocation, program design as well policy recommendation ensuring that advocacy is grounded in real-world experiences rather than assumptions.

Our journey ahead is one of collective action, defined both by purpose and partnerships. What began as a simple effort to provide support to families is evolving into a movement that is reimagining how families, communities, professionals and systems can work together to create an ecosystem of care that is rooted in inclusivity, acceptance and sustainability. This next chapter will be shaped through collaboration with caregivers who continue to inspire by turning personal challenges into leadership, with partner organisations that share a commitment to inclusion, and with public systems that can transform scale into equity. Every story shared, every partnership built, and every policy influenced brings us closer to a future where caregiving is not a lonely struggle but a supported journey.
